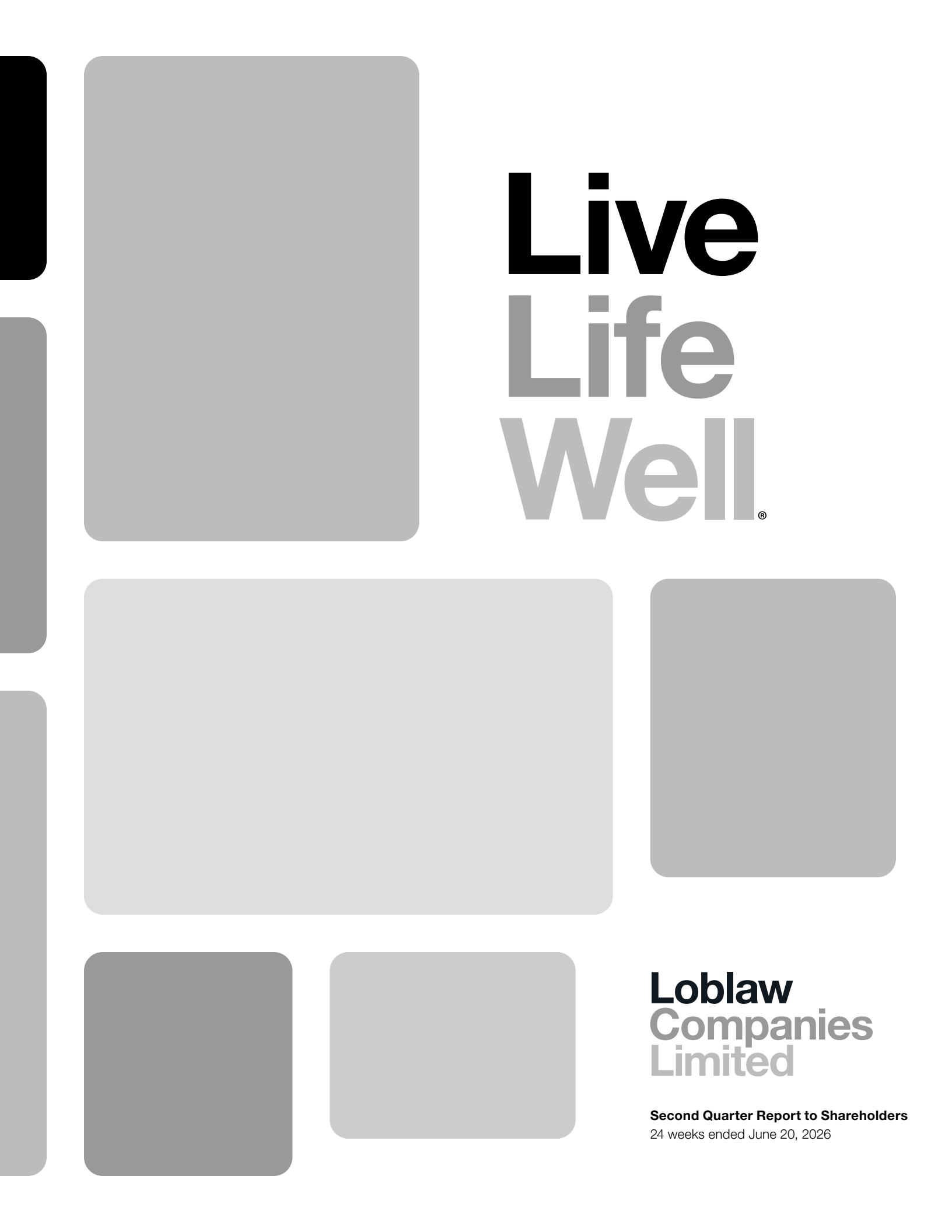

2026 Second Quarter Report to Shareholders

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Management's Discussion and Analysis

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The following Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") for Loblaw Companies Limited and its subsidiaries (collectively, the "Company" or "Loblaw") should be read in conjunction with the Company's second quarter 2026 unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements and the accompanying notes ("interim financial statements") included within the Quarterly Report, the audited annual consolidated financial statements and the accompanying notes for the year ended January 3, 2026 and the related MD&A included in the Company's 2025 Annual Report.

The Company's second quarter 2026 interim financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standard 34, "Interim Financial Reporting", as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IFRS Accounting Standards" or "GAAP"). These interim financial statements include the accounts of the Company and other entities that the Company controls and are reported in Canadian dollars, except when otherwise noted.

In the third quarter of 2025, the Company completed a four-for-one stock split of its outstanding common shares. The stock split was implemented by way of a stock dividend, with shareholders receiving three additional common shares for each common share held. The stock split was effective at the close of business on August 18, 2025, for shareholders of record as of the close of business on August 14, 2025. All share and per share amounts presented herein have been retrospectively adjusted to reflect the stock split. For additional information, see note 9 "Share Capital" of the Company's interim financial statements.

In the fourth quarter of 2025, Loblaw entered into a definitive agreement (the "Transaction Agreement") with EQB Inc. ("EQB") pursuant to which EQB will acquire President's Choice Bank ("PC Bank"), PC Financial Insurance Agency Inc., PC Financial Insurance Broker Inc. and certain other affiliated entities of PC Bank (collectively, "PC Financial") (the "Sale of PC Financial").

As at June 20, 2026 and January 3, 2026, the assets and liabilities of PC Financial have been classified as held for sale and PC Financial's results, net of intersegment eliminations, have been presented separately as discontinued operations in the Company's current and comparative results. Unless otherwise indicated, all financial information represents the Company's results from continuing operations (Retail).

Subsequent to the end of the second quarter, on July 1, 2026, Loblaw completed the Sale of PC Financial for total consideration of \$1,234 million, consisting of 7.2 million common shares of EQB with a fair value of \$963 million, \$235 million in cash, and \$36 million related to certain commodity tax receivables. The Sale of PC Financial will result in a gain on sale, net of transaction costs, of approximately \$375 million, before income taxes, within discontinued operations in the third quarter of 2026. The total consideration and related gain on sale are preliminary and subject to adjustment pursuant to the terms of the Transaction Agreement. As of the date of closing, Loblaw owned approximately 19.9% of EQB's issued and outstanding common shares.

Starting in the third quarter of 2026, the Company will no longer report PC Financial results and will begin to recognize its proportionate share of EQB's net income within its consolidated financial results based on the most recent publicly available information at each of the Company's fiscal year and quarter end dates. The Company and EQB have different fiscal year and quarter ends. As a result of the difference in reporting periods and the timing of the close of the Sale of PC Financial, the Company will recognize only one month of income from EQB in the third quarter of 2026 and three months of income from EQB in the fourth quarter of 2026, and in each quarter thereafter.

Management uses non-GAAP and other financial measures to exclude the impact of certain expenses and income that must be recognized under GAAP when analyzing consolidated and segment underlying operating performance, as the excluded items are not necessarily reflective of the Company's underlying operating performance and make comparisons of underlying financial performance between periods difficult. The Company adjusts for these items if it believes doing so would result in a more effective analysis of underlying operating performance. The exclusion of certain items does not imply that they are non-recurring. See Section 11 "Non-GAAP and Other Financial Measures" for more information on the Company's non-GAAP and other financial measures.

A glossary of terms used throughout this Quarterly Report can be found at the back of the Company's 2025 Annual Report.

Terms denoted with numerical references throughout the MD&A of this Quarterly Report are defined in the MD&A Endnotes section.

Loblaw delivered strong second quarter 2026 results. In its last quarter prior to the close of the sale of PC Financial, the Company recorded total revenue of \$15,270 million and adjusted diluted net earnings per common share growth of 11.9%. Starting in the third quarter of 2026, the Company will no longer report PC Financial results and will begin recognizing its proportionate share of EQB's net income in its consolidated financial results. Retail sales increased by 4.1% to \$15,046 million, reflecting continued strength across the business, including contributions from new store openings. In Food Retail, sales grew 3.3%, supported by higher customer traffic and basket size, and e-commerce sales growth. The Company's discount banners once again outperformed, reflecting continued consumer demand for value and greater access to Maxi® and No Frills® stores. E-commerce sales continued to grow, supported by PC Express™ delivery and integrated third-party delivery options. In Drug Retail, sales grew 6.1%, driven by continued strength in specialty and chronic prescriptions, as well as the beauty and over-the-counter ("OTC") categories. Loblaw continued its focus on strategic expansion, opening 14 stores across its Food Retail and Drug Retail network, including 7 Hard Discount stores, 3 drug stores, and the first T&T® location in California, bringing convenient access to nutritious food, multicultural offerings and essential healthcare services to more communities.

Net Earnings Available to Common Shareholders of the Company and Diluted Net Earnings Per Common Share

Net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company in the second quarter of 2026 were \$751 million (0.64 per common share), an increase of \$37 million (\$0.05 per common share), or 5.2%, compared to the same period in 2025.

Adjusted net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company⁽²⁾ in the second quarter of 2026 were \$774 million, an increase of \$61 million, or 8.6%, compared to the same period in 2025. Adjusted diluted net earnings per common share⁽²⁾ were \$0.66, an increase of \$0.07, or 11.9%.

Year-to-date net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company were \$1,345 million (\$1.15 per common share), an increase of \$128 million (\$0.14 per common share), or 10.5%, compared to the same period in 2025.

Year-to-date adjusted net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company⁽²⁾ were \$1,383 million, an increase of \$100 million, or 7.8%, compared to the same period in 2025. Adjusted diluted net earnings per common share⁽²⁾ were \$1.18, an increase of \$0.12, or 11.3%.

Net Earnings Available to Common Shareholders of the Company from Continuing Operations and Diluted Net Earnings Per Common Share from Continuing Operations

Net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company from continuing operations in the second quarter of 2026 were \$720 million (\$0.61 per common share), an increase of \$27 million (\$0.04 per common share), or 3.9%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an improvement in the underlying operating performance of \$36 million, partially offset by an unfavourable change in adjusting items totaling \$9 million, as described below:

- the improvement in the underlying operating performance of \$36 million (\$0.03 per common share) was primarily due to the following:
 - an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾, partially offset by an increase in selling, general and administrative expenses ("SG&A") and depreciation and amortization.
- the unfavourable change in adjusting items totaling \$9 million (\$0.01 per common share) was primarily due to the following:
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on investments of \$11 million (\$0.01 per common share); and
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on fuel and foreign currency contracts of \$4 million (\$0.01 per common share);
 partially offset by,
 - the favourable impact of deferred tax on the outside basis difference related to the Sale of PC Financial of \$7 million (\$0.01 per common share);
- diluted net earnings per common share also included the favourable impact from the repurchase of common shares over the last 12 months (\$0.02 per common share).

Adjusted net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company⁽²⁾ from continuing operations in the second quarter of 2026 were \$728 million, an increase of \$36 million, or 5.2%, compared to the same period in 2025. Adjusted diluted net earnings per common share⁽²⁾ from continuing operations were \$0.62 per common share, an increase of \$0.05, or 8.8%.

Year-to-date net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company from continuing operations were \$1,307 million (\$1.12 per common share), an increase of \$133 million (\$0.15 per common share), or 11.3%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an improvement in the underlying operating performance of \$66 million and a favourable change in adjusting items totaling \$67 million, as described below:

- the improvement in the underlying operating performance of \$66 million (\$0.06 per common share) was primarily due to the following:
 - an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾, partially offset by an increase in SG&A and depreciation and amortization, excluding the impact of lower amortization related to certain intangible assets associated with the 2014 acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart Corporation ("Shoppers Drug Mart"), which are now fully amortized.
- the favourable change in adjusting items totaling \$67 million (\$0.06 per common share) was primarily due to the following:
 - the year-over-year favourable change in amortization of intangible assets of \$78 million (\$0.07 per common share) primarily related to certain intangible assets associated with the 2014 acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart, which are now fully amortized;
 - the year-over-year favourable change in fair value adjustment on fuel and foreign currency contracts of \$11 million (\$0.01 per common share); and
 - the favourable impact of deferred tax on the outside basis difference related to the Sale of PC Financial of \$7 million (\$0.01 per common share);partially offset by,
 - the year-over-year unfavourable impact of the gain on sale of non-operating properties of \$13 million (\$0.01 per common share);
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on investments of \$11 million (\$0.01 per common share); and
 - the prior year unfavourable impact of the gain related to the sale of Wellwise by Shoppers ("Wellwise") of \$5 million (\$0.01 per common share).
- diluted net earnings per common share also included the favourable impact from the repurchase of common shares over the last 12 months (\$0.03 per common share).

Adjusted net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company⁽²⁾ from continuing operations were \$1,306 million, an increase of \$66 million, or 5.3%, compared to the same period in 2025. Adjusted diluted net earnings per common share⁽²⁾ from continuing operations were \$1.11 per common share, an increase of \$0.09, or 8.8%.

Revenue Revenue represents Retail revenue, and is primarily comprised of Food Retail and Drug Retail sales. The following table provides a breakdown of the Company's total and same-store sales.

- (i) As a result of the announcement of the sale of PC Financial, year-to-date Food Retail sales now include revenue related to PC Services of \$131 million (2025 – \$135 million), primarily driven by sales attributable to The Mobile Shop™ in the current and comparative periods presented.

Revenue was \$15,046 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$589 million, or 4.1%, compared to the same period in 2025. Excluding the impact of revenue related to the Theodore and Pringle® optical business, revenue increased by 4.2%. This increase was primarily driven by the following factors:

- Food Retail same-store sales growth was 1.6% (2025 – 3.5%) for the quarter.
 - Same-store sales growth in food was moderate;
 - Same-store sales growth in pharmacy was strong;
 - The Company's internal food inflation was lower than the Consumer Price Index for Food Purchased From Stores of 4.0% (2025 – 3.3%); and
 - Food Retail traffic increased and basket size increased.
- Drug Retail same-store sales growth was 4.6% (2025 – 4.1%) for the quarter.
 - Pharmacy and healthcare services same-store sales growth was 7.5% (2025 – 6.2%) led by specialty and chronic prescriptions. The number of prescriptions dispensed increased by 3.8% (2025 – 3.2%). On a same-store basis, the number of prescriptions dispensed increased by 3.4% (2025 – 3.1%) and the average prescription value increased by 5.5% (2025 – 3.9%); and
 - Front store same-store sales growth was 1.3% (2025 – 1.7%). The growth in front store same-store sales was primarily driven by higher sales of beauty and OTC products, partially offset by the timing of Easter.
- The wind-down of the *Theodore & Pringle* optical business was completed in 2025. Revenue related to the optical business in the second quarter of 2026 was nil (2025 – \$17 million).

In the second quarter of 2026, 14 food and drug stores were opened and 6 food and drug stores were closed. Retail square footage was 73.8 million square feet, a net increase of 1.3 million square feet, or 1.8%, compared to the same period in 2025.

On a year-to-date basis, revenue was \$29,530 million, an increase of \$1,169 million, or 4.1%, when compared to the same period in 2025. Food Retail sales of \$20,855 million increased by \$720 million, or 3.6%. Food Retail same-store sales grew by 2.0% (2025 – 2.9%). Drug Retail sales of \$8,675 million increased by \$449 million, or 5.5%. Drug Retail same-store sales growth was 4.4% (2025 – 3.9%), with pharmacy and healthcare services same-store sales growth of 7.1% (2025 – 6.3%), and front store same-store sales growth of 1.2% (2025 – 1.3%).

In addition to the wind-down of the *Theodore & Pringle* optical business, the sale of Wellwise was completed in 2025. On a year-to-date basis, revenue related to Wellwise and the optical business was nil (2025 – \$21 million and \$35 million, respectively). Excluding the impact of revenue related to Wellwise and the *Theodore and Pringle* optical business, revenue increased by 4.3%.

Gross Profit⁽²⁾ Gross profit⁽²⁾ was \$4,851 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$217 million, or 4.7%, compared to the same period in 2025. Gross profit percentage⁽²⁾ of 32.2% was stable, increasing by 10 basis points, including continued improvements in shrink.

Year-to-date gross profit⁽²⁾ was \$9,399 million, an increase of \$381 million, or 4.2%, compared to the same period in 2025. Gross profit percentage⁽²⁾ was flat at 31.8%, primarily driven by changes in sales mix in Drug Retail categories, offset by continued improvements in shrink.

Operating Income Operating income was \$1,202 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$34 million, or 2.9%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an improvement in underlying operating performance of \$53 million, partially offset by an unfavourable change in adjusting items totaling \$19 million, as described below:

- the improvement in underlying operating performance of \$53 million was due to an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾, partially offset by an increase in SG&A and depreciation and amortization.
- the unfavourable change in adjusting items totaling \$19 million was primarily due to the following:
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on investments of \$12 million; and
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on fuel and foreign currency contracts of \$7 million;

Year-to-date operating income was \$2,212 million, an increase of \$206 million, or 10.3%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an improvement in underlying operating performance of \$117 million and a favourable change in adjusting items totaling \$89 million, as described below:

- the improvement in underlying operating performance of \$117 million was due to an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾, partially offset by an increase in SG&A and depreciation and amortization, excluding the impact of lower amortization related to certain intangible assets associated with the 2014 acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart, which are now fully amortized.
- the favourable change in adjusting items totaling \$89 million was primarily due to the following:
 - the year-over-year favourable change in the amortization of intangible assets of \$106 million primarily related to certain intangible assets associated with the 2014 acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart, which are now fully amortized; and
 - the year-over-year favourable change in fair value adjustment on fuel and foreign currency contracts of \$14 million;
 partially offset by,
 - the year-over-year unfavourable impact of the gain on sale of non-operating properties of \$14 million;
 - the year-over-year unfavourable change in fair value adjustment on investments of \$12 million; and
 - the prior year unfavourable impact of the gain related to the sale of Wellwise of \$5 million.

Adjusted EBITDA⁽²⁾ Adjusted EBITDA⁽²⁾ was \$1,841 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$93 million, or 5.3%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾ of \$217 million, partially offset by an increase in SG&A of \$124 million. SG&A as a percentage of sales was flat at 20.0%, primarily due to operating leverage from higher sales, offset by incremental costs related to opening new stores and the automated distribution facility, and the year-over-year impact of certain real estate activities.

Year-to-date adjusted EBITDA⁽²⁾ was \$3,448 million in 2026, an increase of \$191 million, or 5.9%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was driven by an increase in gross profit⁽²⁾ of \$381 million, partially offset by an increase in SG&A of \$190 million. SG&A as a percentage of sales was 20.2%, a favourable decrease of 10 basis points compared to the same period in 2025, primarily due to operating leverage from higher sales, partially offset by incremental costs related to opening new stores and the automated distribution facility, and the year-over-year impact of certain real estate activities.

Depreciation and Amortization Depreciation and amortization was \$628 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$40 million, or 6.8%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily due to an increase in depreciation of leased assets and fixed assets related to opening new stores and the automated distribution facility, partially offset by a decrease in depreciation of IT assets. Included in depreciation and amortization was the amortization of intangible assets related to the acquisitions of Shoppers Drug Mart and Lifemark Health Group ("Lifemark") of \$9 million (2025 – \$9 million).

Year-to-date depreciation and amortization was \$1,247 million, a decrease of \$32 million, or 2.5% compared to the same period in 2025. This decrease was primarily driven by the impact of lower amortization related to certain intangible assets associated with the 2014 acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart, which are now fully amortized and a decrease in depreciation of IT assets, partially offset by an increase in depreciation of leased assets and fixed assets related to opening new stores and the automated distribution facility. Included in depreciation and amortization was the amortization of intangible assets related to the acquisitions of Shoppers Drug Mart and Lifemark of \$19 million (2025 – \$125 million).

Net Interest Expense and Other Financing Charges Net interest expense and other financing charges in the second quarter of 2026 were \$183 million, an increase of \$10 million, or 5.8%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily driven by an increase in interest expense from long term debt and lower interest income on certain short term investments.

Year-to-date net interest expense and other financing charges were \$364 million, an increase of \$29 million, or 8.7%, compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily driven by an increase in interest expense from long term debt, lower capitalization of interest expense related to the Company's automated distribution facility, lower interest income on certain short term investments and an increase in interest expense from lease liabilities.

Income Taxes Income tax expense in the second quarter of 2026 was \$263 million (2025 – \$259 million) and the effective tax rate was 25.8% (2025 – 26.0%). The decrease to the effective tax rate was primarily attributable to the deferred tax recovery recorded in respect of the outside basis difference of the Company's investment in PC Financial, partially offset by the non-taxable portion of the gain from real estate dispositions during the second quarter of 2025. Adjusted income tax expense⁽²⁾ in the second quarter of 2026 was \$275 million (2025 – \$261 million) and the adjusted effective tax rate⁽²⁾ was 26.5% (2025 – 26.2%). The increase in the adjusted effective tax rate⁽²⁾ was primarily attributable to the non-taxable portion of the gain from real estate dispositions during the second quarter of 2025.

Year-to-date income tax expense was \$480 million (2025 – \$435 million) and the effective tax rate was 26.0% (2025 – 26.0%). The effective tax rate was flat when compared to 2025. Year-to-date adjusted income tax expense⁽²⁾ was \$489 million (2025 – \$466 million) and the adjusted effective tax rate⁽²⁾ was 26.3% (2025 – 26.4%). The decrease to the adjusted effective tax rate⁽²⁾ was primarily attributable to the non-taxable portion of the gain from real estate dispositions during 2025 partially offset by the impact of other non-deductible items.

Net Earnings Attributable To Non-Controlling Interests Net earnings attributable to non-controlling interests in the second quarter of 2026 were \$36 million, a decrease of \$7 million, or 16.3%, compared to the same period in 2025. The decrease was primarily driven by a decrease in franchisee earnings after profit sharing. Non-controlling interests represent the share of earnings that relates to the Company's Food Retail franchisees and is impacted by the timing of when profit sharing with franchisees is agreed and finalized under the terms of the agreements.

Year-to-date net earnings attributable to non-controlling interests were \$61 million, a decrease of \$1 million, or 1.6%, compared to the same period in 2025, primarily driven by a decrease in franchisee earnings after profit sharing. Non-controlling interests represent the share of earnings that relates to the Company's Food Retail franchisees and is impacted by the timing of when profit sharing with franchisees is agreed and finalized under the terms of the agreements.

Discontinued Operations As a result of the announcement of the sale of PC Financial to EQB in the fourth quarter of 2025, the results of PC Financial are presented in discontinued operations, net of intersegment eliminations.

Revenue Revenue, included in discontinued operations, was \$224 million in the second quarter of 2026, an increase of \$9 million compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily driven by higher interest income.

Year-to-date revenue was \$464 million, an increase of \$18 million compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily driven by higher interest income.

Net Earnings Available to Common Shareholders of the Company Net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company from discontinued operations in the second quarter of 2026 were \$31 million, an increase of \$10 million compared to the same period in 2025. The increase was primarily driven by:

- benefits resulting from changes in certain income tax legislation,
 - lower depreciation and amortization expense, and
 - higher revenue as described above;
- partially offset by,
- transaction costs related to the Sale of PC Financial.

Year-to-date net earnings available to common shareholders of the Company from discontinued operations were \$38 million, a decrease of \$5 million compared to the same period 2025. The decrease was primarily driven by:

- a charge of \$24 million due to a change in certain commodity tax legislation, and
 - transaction costs related to the Sale of PC Financial;
- partially offset by,
- benefits resulting from changes in certain income tax legislation,
 - lower depreciation and amortization expense, and
 - higher revenue as described above.

As at June 20, 2026, credit card receivables were classified as assets held for sale. As at June 20, 2026, credit card receivables were \$4,264 million, an increase of \$289 million compared to June 14, 2025. This increase was primarily driven by growth in the active customer base. The expected credit loss allowance for credit card receivables was \$255 million, a decrease of \$18 million compared to June 14, 2025. The decrease is reflective of the current consumer credit trends.

Starting in the third quarter of 2026, the Company will no longer report PC Financial results and will begin to recognize its proportionate share of EQB's net income within its consolidated financial results based on the most recent publicly available information at each of the Company's fiscal year and quarter end dates. The Company and EQB have different fiscal year and quarter ends. As a result of the difference in reporting periods and the timing of the close of the Sale of PC Financial, the Company will recognize only one month of income from EQB in the third quarter of 2026 and three months of income from EQB in the fourth quarter of 2026, and in each quarter thereafter.

Cash Flows from Operating Activities Cash flows from operating activities in the second quarter of 2026 were \$1,764 million, an increase of \$401 million compared to the second quarter of 2025. The increase was primarily driven by the favourable change in non-cash working capital and higher cash earnings.

Year-to-date cash flows from operating activities were \$3,072 million, an increase of \$756 million compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The increase was primarily driven by the favourable change in non-cash working capital, the year-over-year change in provisions, and higher cash earnings, partially offset by lower payments from cardholders on credit card receivables.

Cash Flows used in Investing Activities Cash flows used in investing activities in the second quarter of 2026 were \$35 million, a decrease of \$405 million compared to the second quarter of 2025. The decrease was primarily driven by the year-over-year change in security deposits and higher disposals of short term investments, partially offset by lower proceeds from disposal of assets and the Company's investment in equity securities.

Year-to-date cash flows used in investing activities were \$707 million, a decrease of \$278 million compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The decrease was primarily driven by higher disposals of short term investments and the year-over-year change in security deposits, partially offset by lower proceeds from disposal of assets and long term securities, the Company's investment in equity securities, and an increase in investments in fixed and intangible assets.

Capital Investments Capital investments in the second quarter of 2026 were \$417 million, an increase of \$8 million or 2%, compared to the second quarter of 2025. The increase was driven by higher intangible asset additions, partially offset by lower fixed asset purchases. Year-to-date capital investments were \$729 million, an increase of \$74 million or 11%, compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The increase was driven by higher fixed asset purchases and intangible asset additions.

Cash Flows used in Financing Activities Cash flows used in financing activities in the second quarter of 2026 were \$1,530 million, an increase of \$623 million compared to the second quarter of 2025. The increase was driven by lower net issuances of long term debt and short term debt, a decrease in demand deposits from customers, and higher repurchases of common shares in the current quarter.

Year-to-date cash flows used in financing activities were \$2,605 million, an increase of \$767 million compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The increase was primarily driven by lower net issuances of long term debt and short term debt, a decrease in demand deposits from customers, and higher repurchases of common shares, partially offset by the redemption of all issued and outstanding Preferred Shares, Series B on January 8, 2025 and lower dividends paid due to the timing of the fourth quarter dividend payment in 2025.

Free cash flow⁽²⁾ from continuing operations in the second quarter of 2026 was \$856 million, an increase of \$235 million compared to the second quarter of 2025. The increase was primarily driven by the favourable change in non-cash working capital and higher cash earnings. Continuing operations were also impacted by higher lease payments compared to the second quarter of 2025. Year-to-date free cash flow⁽²⁾ from continuing operations was \$1,288 million, an increase of \$964 million compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The increase was primarily driven by the favourable change in non-cash working capital, the year-over-year change in provisions, and higher cash earnings. Continuing operations were also impacted by an increase in capital investments, partially offset by lower lease payments compared to the first two quarters of 2025.

Free cash flow⁽²⁾ used in discontinued operations in the second quarter of 2026 was \$49 million, an increase of \$104 million compared to the second quarter of 2025. The increase was driven primarily by a favourable change in non-cash working capital compared to the second quarter of 2025. Discontinued operations were also impacted by higher interest paid compared to the second quarter of 2025. Year-to-date free cash flow⁽²⁾ from discontinued operations was \$140 million, a decrease of \$219 million compared to the first two quarters of 2025. The decrease was driven primarily by lower payments from cardholders on credit card receivables and an unfavourable change in non-cash working capital, partially offset by lower income taxes paid, compared to the first two quarters of 2025. Discontinued operations were also impacted by higher interest paid compared to the first two quarters of 2025.

4.2 Liquidity and Capital Structure

The Company expects that cash and cash equivalents, short term investments, future operating cash flows and the amounts available to be drawn against committed credit facilities will enable the Company to finance its capital investment program and fund its ongoing business requirements over the next 12 months, including working capital, pension plan funding requirements and financial obligations.

The rolling year adjusted return on equity⁽²⁾ as at June 20, 2026 increased compared to June 14, 2025, driven by an improvement in the underlying operating performance and a decrease in average equity. The decrease in average equity was due to a decrease in share capital, partially offset by the impact of preferred shares redemption in the fourth quarter of 2024. The rolling year adjusted return on equity⁽²⁾ as at June 20, 2026 increased compared to January 3, 2026, due to a decrease in average equity primarily driven by a decrease in share capital, and an improvement in the underlying operating performance.

The rolling year adjusted return on capital⁽²⁾ as at June 20, 2026 increased compared to January 3, 2026, due to an improvement in adjusted operating income⁽²⁾, partially offset by an increase in average capital, primarily due to a decrease in cash and cash equivalent and an increase in lease liabilities.

In the third quarter of 2025, the Company completed a four-for-one stock split of its outstanding common shares. The stock split was implemented by way of a stock dividend, with shareholders receiving three additional common shares for each common share held. The stock split was effective at the close of business on August 18, 2025, for shareholders of record as of the close of business on August 14, 2025.

Subsequent to the end of the second quarter of 2026, the Board of Directors declared a quarterly dividend of \$0.155183 per common share, payable on October 1, 2026 to shareholders of record on September 15, 2026.

In the second quarter of 2026, the Company renewed its Normal Course Issuer Bid ("NCIB") to purchase on the Toronto Stock Exchange or through alternative trading systems up to 58,124,733 of the Company's common shares, representing approximately 5% of issued and outstanding common shares. As at June 20, 2026, the Company had purchased 4,843,677 common shares for cancellation under its current NCIB. The Company is still permitted to purchase its common shares from George Weston Limited ("Weston") under its NCIB, pursuant to an automatic disposition plan agreement among the Company's broker, the Company and Weston, in order for Weston to maintain its proportionate ownership interest in the Company. The maximum number of common shares that may be purchased pursuant to the NCIB will be reduced by the number of common shares purchased from Weston.

During the second quarter of 2026, 8,826,585 common shares (2025 – 8,208,820) were purchased under the NCIB for cancellation, for aggregate consideration of \$552 million (2025 – \$445 million), including 4,398,963 common shares (2025 – 3,708,940) purchased from Weston, for aggregate consideration of \$275 million (2025 – \$200 million). On a year-to-date basis, 19,023,507 common shares (2025 – 18,150,440) were purchased under the NCIB for cancellation, for aggregate consideration of \$1,200 million (2025 – \$902 million), including 9,268,762 common shares (2025 – 8,303,956) purchased from Weston, for aggregate consideration of \$584 million (2025 – \$411 million).

The Company participates in an automatic share purchase plan ("ASPP") with a broker in order to facilitate the repurchase of the Company's common shares under its NCIB. During the effective period of the ASPP, the Company's broker may purchase common shares at times when the Company would not be active in the market. As at June 20, 2026, an obligation to repurchase shares of \$250 million was recognized under the ASPP in trade payables and other liabilities.

4.6 Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

The Company uses off-balance sheet arrangements, including letters of credit, guarantees and cash collateralization in connection with certain obligations. There were no significant changes to these off-balance sheet arrangements during the second quarter of 2026. For a discussion of the Company's significant off-balance sheet arrangements, see Section 6.7 "Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements" of the Company's 2025 Annual Report.

5. Financial Derivative Instruments

The Company uses derivative instruments to offset certain of its financial risks. The Company uses bond forwards to manage its anticipated exposure to fluctuations in interest rates on future debt issuances. The Company also uses futures and forward contracts to manage its anticipated exposure to fluctuations in commodity prices and exchange rates in its underlying operations. These derivative instruments are designated as cash flow hedges.

In 2023, the Company entered into a 20 year arrangement to hedge energy pricing on its purchases in Alberta beginning on January 1, 2025. The hedge has a notional value of \$223 million. In the second quarter of 2026 and year-to-date, a fair value gain of \$2 million (2025 – fair value gain of \$6 million) and a fair value gain of \$2 million (2025 – fair value loss of \$4 million), respectively, was recorded in other comprehensive income related to the energy hedge. The fair value of the derivative was included in other liabilities.

The Company also uses futures and forward contracts to manage its anticipated exposure to fluctuations in commodity prices and exchange rates on its underlying operations. These derivative instruments are not designated in a formal hedging relationship. For further details on the impact of these instruments during the second quarter of 2026, see Section 11 "Non-GAAP and Other Financial Measures" of the MD&A.

6. Results by Quarter

The Company follows a 52-week reporting cycle which periodically necessitates a fiscal year of 53 weeks due to an accounting convention common in the retail industry. Fiscal years 2026 and 2024 were 52 weeks and fiscal year 2025 was 53 weeks. The 52-week reporting cycle is divided into four quarters of 12 weeks each except for the third quarter, which is 16 weeks in duration. When a fiscal year such as 2025 contains 53 weeks, the fourth quarter is 13 weeks in duration.

 - deferred tax on outside basis difference related to the Sale of PC Financial.

7. Internal Control over Financial Reporting

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of disclosure controls and procedures to provide reasonable assurance that all material information relating to the Company and its subsidiaries is gathered and reported to senior management on a timely basis so that appropriate decisions can be made regarding public disclosure.

Management is also responsible for establishing and maintaining adequate internal controls over financial reporting to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of financial reporting and the preparation of consolidated financial statements for external purposes in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

In designing such controls, it should be recognized that due to inherent limitations, any control, no matter how well designed and operated, can provide only reasonable assurance of achieving the desired control objectives and may not prevent or detect misstatements. Projections of any evaluations of effectiveness to future periods are subject to the risk that controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate. Additionally, management is required to use judgment in evaluating controls and procedures.

Changes in Internal Control over Financial Reporting There were no changes in the Company's internal control over financial reporting in the second quarter of 2026 that materially affected, or are reasonably likely to materially affect the Company's internal control over financial reporting.

8. Enterprise Risks and Risk Management

A detailed full set of risks inherent in the Company's business are included in the Company's AIF for the year ended January 3, 2026 and the Company's MD&A in the Company's 2025 Annual Report, which are hereby incorporated by reference. The Company's AIF and 2025 Annual Report are available online on www.sedarplus.ca. Those risks and risk management strategies remain unchanged.

9. Adoption of Accounting Standards and Amendments

Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 In May 2024, amendments to IFRS 9, "Financial Instruments" ("IFRS 9") and IFRS 7, "Financial Instruments: Disclosures" ("IFRS 7") were issued. The amendments clarify the timing of recognition and derecognition for a financial asset or financial liability, including clarifying that a financial liability is derecognized on the settlement date. In addition to these clarifications, the amendments introduce an accounting policy choice to derecognize financial liabilities settled using an electronic payment system before the settlement date, if specific conditions are met. Also included in the amendments, are clarifications regarding the classification of financial assets, including those with features linked to environmental, social and corporate governance. Under the amendments, additional disclosures are required for financial instruments with contingent features and investments in equity instruments classified at fair value through other comprehensive income.

These amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2026. The adoption of these amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements. For financial liabilities settled in cash using an electronic payment system, the Company applied the election to deem these financial liabilities to be discharged before the settlement date. The amendments have been applied retrospectively with no restatement of comparative information, in accordance with transition requirements on the initial application of IFRS 9. The adjustment to the cash balance reflects a \$49 million increase to the opening balance of cash and cash equivalents in the condensed consolidated statements of cash flows for the 24 weeks ended June 20, 2026.

Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 In December 2024, amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 were issued to enhance the transparency of nature-dependent electricity contracts. The amendments allow a company to apply an own-use exemption to certain power purchase agreements if certain requirements are met. The amendments require further disclosure where an own-use exemption is applied regarding the contractual features exposing the company to variability in electricity volume and risk of oversupply, unrecognized contractual commitments and the effect of the contracts on an entity's financial performance. The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2026 and were adopted by the Company on a prospective basis. The adoption of these amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements.

10. Outlook⁽³⁾

Loblaw will continue to execute on retail excellence while advancing its growth initiatives with the goal of delivering consistent operational and financial results in 2026. The Company's businesses remain well positioned to meet the everyday needs of Canadians. In 2026, including the impact of recognizing only one month of income from EQB in the third quarter of 2026, and excluding the 53rd week impact in 2025, the Company continues to expect:

- its Retail business to grow earnings faster than sales;
- adjusted net earnings per common share⁽²⁾ growth in the high single-digits;
- to invest approximately \$2.4 billion in gross capital expenditures in its store network and distribution centres; and
- to return capital to shareholders by allocating a significant portion of free cash flow to share repurchases.

11. Non-GAAP and Other Financial Measures

The Company uses the following non-GAAP and other financial measures and ratios: gross profit, gross profit percentage, adjusted earnings before income taxes, net interest expense and other financing charges and depreciation and amortization ("adjusted EBITDA"); adjusted EBITDA margin; adjusted operating income; adjusted net interest expense and other financing charges; adjusted income taxes; adjusted effective tax rate; adjusted net earnings available to common shareholders; adjusted diluted net earnings per common share; revenue (including Retail and PC Financial); free cash flow; debt to adjusted EBITDA; adjusted return on equity; adjusted return on capital; and same-store sales. The Company believes these non-GAAP and other financial measures and ratios provide useful information to both management and investors in measuring the financial performance and financial condition of the Company for the reasons outlined below.

Management uses these and other non-GAAP and other financial measures to exclude the impact of certain expenses and income that must be recognized under GAAP when analyzing underlying consolidated operating performance, as the excluded items are not necessarily reflective of the Company's underlying operating performance and make comparisons of underlying financial performance between periods difficult. The Company adjusts for these items if it believes doing so would result in a more effective analysis of underlying operating performance. The exclusion of certain items does not imply that they are non-recurring.

These measures do not have a standardized meaning prescribed by GAAP and therefore they may not be comparable to similarly titled measures presented by other publicly traded companies and should not be construed as an alternative to other financial measures determined in accordance with GAAP.

As a result of the announcement of the sale of PC Financial, the results of PC Financial, net of intersegment eliminations, are presented separately as discontinued operations in the Company's current and comparative results. Unless otherwise indicated, all financial information represents the Company's results from continuing operations (Retail).

Amortization of intangible assets acquired with Shoppers Drug Mart and Lifemark The acquisition of Shoppers Drug Mart in 2014 included approximately \$6,050 million of definite life intangible assets, which are being amortized over their estimated useful lives. The annual amortization associated with the acquired intangibles will be approximately \$30 million in 2026 and thereafter.

The acquisition of Lifemark in 2022 included approximately \$299 million of definite life intangible assets, which are being amortized over their estimated useful lives.

Fair value adjustment on investments The Company holds certain investments, including Venture Fund investments, classified as fair value through profit and loss. Any changes in the fair value of these investments are included in operating income. Starting in the first quarter of 2026, fair value adjustment on such investments are considered an adjusting item. Sale of Wellwise In the fourth quarter of 2024, the Company entered into an agreement with a third party to sell all of the shares of its Wellwise business, including 42 Wellwise locations, for cash proceeds and recorded a net fair value write-down of \$23 million in SG&A. The transaction closed in the first quarter of 2025 and the Company recorded a gain of \$5 million in SG&A.

Gain on sale of non-operating properties In the second quarter of 2026 and year-to-date, the Company recorded a gain related to the sale of a non-operating property to a third party of \$1 million (second quarter of 2025 and year-to-date – \$1 million and gain on non-operating properties of \$15 million, respectively).

Fair value adjustment on fuel and foreign currency contracts The Company is exposed to commodity price and U.S. dollar exchange rate fluctuations. In accordance with the Company's commodity risk management policy, the Company enters into exchange traded futures contracts and forward contracts to minimize cost volatility relating to fuel prices and the U.S. dollar exchange rate. These derivatives are not acquired for trading or speculative purposes. Pursuant to the Company's derivative instruments accounting policy, changes in the fair value of these instruments, which include realized and unrealized gains and losses, are recorded in operating income. Despite the impact of accounting for these commodity and foreign currency derivatives on the Company's reported results, the derivatives have the economic impact of largely mitigating the associated risks arising from price and exchange rate fluctuations in the underlying commodities and U.S. dollar commitments.

Notes to the Unaudited Interim Period Condensed Consolidated Financial Statements

For the periods ended June 20, 2026 and June 14, 2025 (millions of Canadian dollars except where otherwise indicated)

Note 1. Nature and Description of the Reporting Entity

Loblaw Companies Limited is a Canadian public company incorporated in 1956 and is Canada's food and pharmacy leader, and the nation's largest retailer. Its registered office is located at 22 St. Clair Avenue East, Toronto, Canada M4T 2S5. Loblaw Companies Limited and its subsidiaries are together referred to, in these consolidated financial statements, as the "Company" or "Loblaw".

The Company's controlling shareholder is George Weston Limited ("Weston"), which owns approximately 52.6% of the Company's outstanding common shares. The Company's ultimate parent is Wittington Investments, Limited. The remaining common shares are widely held.

The Company provides customers with grocery, pharmacy and healthcare services, other health and beauty products, apparel, general merchandise, and wireless mobile products and services. The Company also provided credit card and everyday banking services and insurance brokerage services until July 1, 2026.

In the fourth quarter of 2025, Loblaw entered into a definitive agreement (the "Transaction Agreement") with EQB Inc. ("EQB") pursuant to which EQB will acquire President's Choice Bank ("PC Bank"), PC Financial Insurance Agency Inc., PC Financial Insurance Broker Inc. and certain other affiliated entities of PC Bank (collectively, "PC Financial") (the "Sale of PC Financial").

As at June 20, 2026 and January 3, 2026, the assets and liabilities of PC Financial have been classified as held for sale, and PC Financial's results, net of intersegment eliminations, have been presented separately as discontinued operations in the Company's current and comparative results (see note 4). All notes to the unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements relate to continuing operations unless indicated otherwise.

Subsequent to the end of the second quarter, on July 1, 2026, Loblaw completed the Sale of PC Financial for total consideration of \$1,234 million, consisting of 7.2 million common shares of EQB with a fair value of \$963 million, \$235 million in cash, and \$36 million related to certain commodity tax receivables. The Sale of PC Financial will result in a gain on sale, net of transaction costs, of approximately \$375 million, before income taxes, within discontinued operations in the third quarter of 2026. The total consideration and related gain on sale are preliminary and subject to adjustment pursuant to the terms of the Transaction Agreement. As of the date of closing, Loblaw owned approximately 19.9% of EQB's issued and outstanding common shares.

In connection with the closing of the Sale of PC Financial, EQB entered into a long-term strategic relationship with Loblaw pursuant to a commercial agreement to become the exclusive financial partner of the PC Optimum™ loyalty program. Additionally, in connection with the closing of the Sale of PC Financial, EQB and Loblaw entered into an investor rights agreement pursuant to which Loblaw will have Board of Directors nomination rights, registration rights and pre-emptive rights, and will be subject to a four-year lock-up and a standstill restricting Loblaw and its affiliates from acquiring common shares of EQB if it would bring Loblaw's ownership above 25% of the issued and outstanding EQB common shares.

The Company's continuing retail operations are comprised of several operating segments and now represent the only reportable segment due to the similar nature of the products and services offered. All material operations are carried out in Canada. No additional segment information is reported.

The Company's business is affected by seasonality and timing of holidays, relative to the Company's interim periods. Accordingly, quarterly performance is not necessarily indicative of annual performance. Historically, the Company has earned more revenue in the fourth quarter relative to the preceding quarters in the Company's fiscal year.

Note 2. Accounting Policies

The accounting policies and critical accounting estimates and judgments as disclosed in the Company's 2025 audited annual consolidated financial statements have been applied consistently in the preparation of these unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements, with the exception of the amendments adopted in fiscal year 2026. These unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements are presented in Canadian dollars.

Statement of Compliance These unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements are prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standard 34, "Interim Financial Reporting", as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IFRS Accounting Standards" or "GAAP") and should be read in conjunction with the Company's 2025 audited annual consolidated financial statements and accompanying notes.

These unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements were approved for issuance by the Company's Board of Directors ("Board") on July 29, 2026.

Note 3. Adoption of Accounting Standards and Amendments

Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 In May 2024, amendments to IFRS 9, "Financial Instruments" ("IFRS 9") and IFRS 7, "Financial Instruments: Disclosures" ("IFRS 7") were issued. The amendments clarify the timing of recognition and derecognition for a financial asset or financial liability, including clarifying that a financial liability is derecognized on the settlement date. In addition to these clarifications, the amendments introduce an accounting policy choice to derecognize financial liabilities settled using an electronic payment system before the settlement date, if specific conditions are met. Also included in the amendments, are clarifications regarding the classification of financial assets, including those with features linked to environmental, social and corporate governance. Under the amendments, additional disclosures are required for financial instruments with contingent features and investments in equity instruments classified at fair value through other comprehensive income.

These amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2026. The adoption of these amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements. For financial liabilities settled in cash using an electronic payment system, the Company applied the election to deem these financial liabilities to be discharged before the settlement date. The amendments have been applied retrospectively with no restatement of comparative information, in accordance with transition requirements on the initial application of IFRS 9. The adjustment to the cash balance reflects a \$49 million increase to the opening balance of cash and cash equivalents in the condensed consolidated statements of cash flows for the 24 weeks ended June 20, 2026.

Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 In December 2024, amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 were issued to enhance the transparency of nature-dependent electricity contracts. The amendments allow a company to apply an own-use exemption to certain power purchase agreements if certain requirements are met. The amendments require further disclosure where an own-use exemption is applied regarding the contractual features exposing the company to variability in electricity volume and risk of oversupply, unrecognized contractual commitments and the effect of the contracts on an entity's financial performance. The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2026 and were adopted by the Company on a prospective basis. The adoption of these amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements.

The associated liabilities of credit card receivables securitized to Eagle and Other Independent Securitization Trusts are recorded as debt.

The Company is still permitted to purchase its common shares from Weston under its NCIB, pursuant to an automatic disposition plan agreement among the Company's broker, the Company and Weston, in order for Weston to maintain its proportionate ownership interest in the Company. The maximum number of common shares that may be purchased pursuant to the NCIB will be reduced by the number of common shares purchased from Weston.

During the second quarter of 2026, 8,826,585 common shares (2025 – 8,208,820) were purchased under the NCIB for cancellation, for aggregate consideration of \$552 million (2025 – \$445 million), including 4,398,963 common shares (2025 – 3,708,940) purchased from Weston, for aggregate consideration of \$275 million (2025 – \$200 million). On a year-to-date basis, 19,023,507 common shares (2025 – 18,150,440) were purchased under the NCIB for cancellation, for aggregate consideration of \$1,200 million (2025 – \$902 million), including 9,268,762 common shares (2025 – 8,303,956) purchased from Weston, for aggregate consideration of \$584 million (2025 – \$411 million).

The Company participates in an automatic share purchase plan ("ASPP") with a broker in order to facilitate the repurchase of the Company's common shares under its NCIB. During the effective period of the ASPP, the Company's broker may purchase common shares at times when the Company would not be active in the market. As at June 20, 2026, an obligation to repurchase shares of \$250 million was recognized under the ASPP in trade payables and other liabilities.

Note 12. Contingent Liabilities

In the ordinary course of business, the Company is involved in and potentially subject to, legal actions and proceedings. In addition, the Company is subject to tax audits from various tax authorities on an ongoing basis. As a result, from time to time, tax authorities may disagree with the positions and conclusions taken by the Company in its tax filings or legislation could be amended or interpretations of current legislation could change, any of which events could lead to reassessments.

There are a number of uncertainties involved in such matters, individually or in aggregate, and as such, there is a possibility that the ultimate resolution of these matters may result in a material adverse effect on the Company's reputation, operations, financial condition or performance in future periods. It is not currently possible to predict the outcome of the Company's legal actions and proceedings with certainty. Management regularly assesses its position on the adequacy of accruals or provisions related to such matters and will make any necessary adjustments.

The following is a description of the Company's significant legal proceedings:

Shoppers Drug Mart Corporation ("Shoppers Drug Mart") was previously served with an Amended Statement of Claim in a class action proceeding that has been filed in the Ontario Superior Court of Justice ("Superior Court") by licensed associates ("Associates"), claiming various declarations and damages resulting from Shoppers Drug Mart's alleged breaches of the Associate Agreement. The class action comprises all of Shoppers Drug Mart's current and former licensed Associates residing in Canada, other than in Quebec, who were parties to Shoppers Drug Mart's 2002 and 2010 forms of the Associate Agreement. On July 9, 2013, the Superior Court certified as a class proceeding portions of the action. A summary judgment trial of the matter was held in December 2022 and on February 17, 2023, the Superior Court released its decision in relation to those summary judgment motions. The Superior Court dismissed the plaintiffs' claims on the majority of the issues including a request for damages at this stage of proceedings. The Superior Court also held that Shoppers Drug Mart breached the 2002 form of Associate Agreement when it did not remit certain amounts that it received from generic drug manufacturers to Associates. On March 20, 2023, the plaintiffs filed a Notice of Appeal and on April 4, 2023, the Company filed a Notice of Cross-Appeal. A hearing for the appeals was held on February 14, 2024 and on February 15, 2024. On August 29, 2024, the Court of Appeal dismissed both the appeal and cross appeal, with the exception that the plaintiff's appeal was allowed to correct the amount Shoppers Drug Mart received in professional allowances during the class period. A hearing has been scheduled for December 2026 to establish a procedure for determining individual issues. The Company has not recorded any amounts related to the potential liability associated with this lawsuit. The Company does not believe that the ultimate resolution of this matter will have a material adverse impact on its financial condition or prospects.

In August 2018, the Province of British Columbia filed a class action against numerous opioid manufacturers and distributors, including the Company and its subsidiaries, Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. and Sanis Health Inc. The claim contains allegations of breach of the Competition Act, fraudulent misrepresentation and deceit and negligence, and seeks unquantified damages for the expenses incurred by the federal government, provinces, and territories of Canada in paying for opioid prescriptions and other healthcare costs related to opioid addiction and abuse in Canada. During the second quarter of 2021, the claim against Loblaw Companies Limited was discontinued. In May 2019, two further opioid-related class actions were commenced in each of Ontario and Quebec against a large group of defendants, including Sanis Health Inc. In February 2022, the plaintiff and Sanis Health Inc. agreed to settle the Quebec action for a nominal amount, with no admission of liability and for the express purpose of avoiding the delays, disruption, and expenses associated with the litigation. The settlement has been approved by the court and is now final. On December 12, 2024, the Ontario action was dismissed against Sanis Health Inc., with costs. In December 2019, a further opioid-related class action was commenced in British Columbia against a large group of defendants, including Sanis Health Inc., Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. and the Company. The allegations in the civil British Columbia class action are similar to the allegations against manufacturer defendants in the Province of British Columbia class action, except that the December 2019 claim seeks recovery of damages on behalf of opioid users directly. In April 2021, the Company, Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. and Sanis Health Inc. were served with another opioid-related class action that was started in Alberta against multiple defendants. In February 2025, Loblaws Inc. and Weston were also served with the claim. The claim seeks damages on behalf of municipalities and local governments in relation to public safety, social services, and criminal justice costs allegedly incurred due to the opioid crisis. In September 2021, the Company, Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. and Sanis Health Inc. were served with a class action started in Saskatchewan by Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation and Lac La Ronge Indian Band on behalf of all Indigenous, Metis, First Nation and Inuit communities and governments in Canada to recover costs they have incurred as a result of the opioid crisis, including healthcare costs, policing costs and societal costs. In October 2024, the claim was discontinued against Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. In May 2026, Loblaws Inc. and Weston were served with the claim.

In January 2024, Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. was served with a second class action in Saskatchewan started by Lac La Ronge Indian Band. The case is brought on behalf of Band members and is claiming damages relating to abatement costs, the diversion of financial and other resources, the reduction in the value of the reserve lands and interests, and lost tax revenues. Shoppers Drug Mart Inc. is being sued as a representative of an international defendant subclass of opioid “dealers” and Sanis Health Inc. is a proposed supplier class member. The Company believes these proceedings are without merit and is vigorously defending them. The Company does not currently have any significant accruals or provisions for these matters recorded in the unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements.

In 2022, the Tax Court of Canada (“Tax Court”) released a decision relating to PC Bank, a former subsidiary of the Company. The Tax Court ruled that PC Bank is not entitled to claim notional input tax credits for certain payments it made to Loblaws Inc. in respect of redemptions of loyalty points. PC Bank subsequently filed a Notice of Appeal with the Federal Court of Appeal (“FCA”) and in March 2024, the matter was heard by the FCA. In the third quarter of 2024, the FCA released its decision and reversed the decision of the Tax Court. As a result, PC Bank reversed charges of \$155 million. Certain taxation years subsequent to the periods covered by the FCA decision remain under review by the tax authorities. In the first quarter of 2026, the Federal government enacted commodity tax legislation rendering PC Bank ineligible to claim such notional input tax credits. As the legislation was effective beginning in fiscal year 2025, PC Bank recorded a charge of \$23 million in the first quarter of 2026 in selling, general and administrative expenses, reversing notional input tax credit related amounts previously recorded. In addition, a charge of \$10 million was recorded in the first quarter of 2026, reversing interest income on expected cash tax refunds.

Indemnification Provisions The Company from time to time enters into agreements in the normal course of its business, such as service and outsourcing arrangements, lease agreements in connection with business or asset acquisitions or dispositions, and other types of commercial agreements. These agreements by their nature may provide for indemnification of counterparties. These indemnification provisions may be in connection with breaches of representations and warranties or in respect of future claims for certain liabilities, including liabilities related to tax and environmental matters. The terms of these indemnification provisions vary in duration and may extend for an unlimited period of time. In addition, the terms of these indemnification provisions vary in amount and certain indemnification provisions do not provide for a maximum potential indemnification amount. Indemnity amounts are dependent on the outcome of future contingent events, the nature and likelihood of which cannot be determined at this time. As a result, the Company is unable to reasonably estimate its total maximum potential liability in respect of indemnification provisions. Historically, the Company has not made any significant payments in connection with these indemnification provisions.

Corporate Profile

Loblaw Companies Limited is a Canadian public company incorporated in 1956 and is Canada's food and pharmacy leader, and the nation's largest retailer. The Company's continuing retail operations are comprised of several operating segments and now represent the only reportable segment due to the similar nature of the products and services offered. All material operations are carried out in Canada. The segment consists primarily of corporate and franchise-owned retail food and Associate-owned drug stores and e-commerce platforms, and includes in-store pharmacies, healthcare services, other health and beauty products, apparel, other general merchandise, wireless products and services, logistics services, retail media and the PC Optimum™ loyalty program. The Company also provided credit card and everyday banking services and insurance brokerage services through its PC Financial business, until its sale to EQB Inc. on July 1, 2026. PC Financial's results, net of intersegment eliminations, have been presented separately as discontinued operations in the Company's current and comparative results.
